As we enter a new year, we continue to change to meet the Federal and State expectations of employment and integration for our individuals.

We are excited about the successes our clients are finding in the area of community employment. 100 individuals are now involved in real community jobs being supported by job coaches from four different agencies. We expect to see another 25 individuals join the working ranks by 2020. What a great feeling to see people working in their community. Their improved self-worth and increased incomes are allowing for even more opportunities for participation in community settings.

Our effort to "reverse integrate" our facilities into a "community" center has led to more than seven outside groups using our facilities. The newest group is a start-up company that wants to

lease space at the workshop while hiring our clients. While they only need one room today, they hope to expand in the near future and include even more clients. For 2017, the Board of Elections has asked to use our center as a polling place for Chester Township.

While change can be scary and unsettling, we are finding that there are some real advantages to our clients as we move toward the future.

BACKGROUND

The mission of the Geauga County Board of Developmental Disabilities is to help local individuals with developmental disabilities live, learn and earn in the community. One of its clients, Trace Waldbauer, has worked at Hamlet Retirement Community in Chagrin Falls for the past two months.

TRACE'S STORY

When Hamlet Retirement Community was looking for an employee, they contacted the Metzenbaum Center. Thanks to his resume and relevant work experience, Trace was hired in September as a dishwasher. Without him, said his supervisor Wynn Jeter, there would be no food service.

"Trace is a great employee," Wynn said. "He is reliable, always on time and he keeps us laughing through the stressful days. He's an important part of our team."

Trace is responsible for washing all dishes, pots and pans, stocking the storeroom on delivery days and keeping the dishpit clean. He works three days a week and his coworkers always look forward to seeing him.

"When I interviewed him, he seemed like he would be a good employee, and he's become one of our best," Wynn said. "He's been a great fit and I wish I had more employees with his constantly positive attitude."

GCBDD'S COMMITMENT

The Geauga County Board is committed to finding employment for the individuals we serve by partnering with private providers and local businesses. Several businesses have embraced this idea, including the Weils of Bainbridge, Hamlet Village, Giant Eagle, Pizza Hut, Kuhnle Brothers, White House Chocolates, Bob Evans, Drug Mart, University Hospitals Geauga Medical Center, Heinen's and Sajar Plastics, LLC.

The ICF had an oversight review completed by the Department of Developmental Disabilities (DODD). As part of the process, the DODD reviewed client records, conducted observations, and ensured compliance to their rules. At the completion of the review, the ICF received a 3-year license, this is the highest that can be received.

Meghan is always involved in something. As a client at Metzenbaum Sheltered Industries, she often volunteers to



set up or clean up after agency fundraisers, social events or sporting practices. In the Special Olympics, Meghan competes in baseball, basketball, volleyball and bowling. She also does therapeutic riding at Fieldstone Farms and loves to dance. She has won many medals in competitions and was part of the team that received a Resolution from the Ohio House of Representatives for their seven gold medals in baseball.

Meghan is a Eucharistic Minister at her church and can be found serving there on most Saturday afternoons. When the Kiwanis opened a division of their service club to individuals with disabilities, Meghan immediately joined.
